## Hill Country Photo Contest Kicks Off March 1st

The grand prize winner will receive \$300 and the winning photograph will grace the cover of the calendar. A distinguished panel of artists, photographers and regional leaders will judge the contest.

"Through our annual contest and calendar, the Hill Country Alliance educates people about the outstanding beauty and unique history of the Hill Country and endeavors to build a culture of conservation in our community," said Sky.

Rapid population growth has placed many of the Hill Country's natural areas and heritage ranch lands at risk and water planning for the future is a tremendous challenge.

"Hill Country landowners love and care for their land. However, together we must do more to protect our threatened ranch lands and natural areas," said Christy Muse, HCA Executive Director. "Protecting these areas not only ensures the economic vitality of our region, but also safeguards clean drinking water and a high quality of life for our children and grandchildren," Christy added.
